## Slate River WI encouraged residents to stitch in time

Slate River, a community just west of the City of Thunder Bay, will have a unique reminder of Ontario's bicentennial year, thanks to the Slate River Women's Institute.

Mary Germain, a branch member and councillor in Paipoonge Township (Slate River is part of Paipoonge) suggested a community quilt as a bicentennial project at a WI meeting. Anyone who resided in Slate River could buy a quilt block for \$1 and decorate it according to their amily's background. Later, the blocks were sewn together as a wall-langing.

Slate River President Mrs. Nellie fulton, said all 96 blocks were completed and returned. Most people included their family name on the block and embroidered in liquid or loss, what their family does or their amily's heritage. For instance, a trawberry farmer included berries in the block while a logger featured a ruck carrying logs.

Mrs. Lois Heald, curator of the aipoonge Museum gratefully acepted the finished wall-hanging which will be on display in the nuseum this summer. "I'm sure it will generate a lot of interest for nany years to come," said Mrs. Heald.

A special open house tea was held a March for Slate River residents to new their handiwork in the comleted wall-hanging.
