Wellington county Women's Institutes are also holding a quilt and art competition to celebrate Ontario's 200th birthday. "Wellington County Heritage" is the theme for the competition. All of the entries will be on display in the ladies building at the site of the I.P.M., at Teviotdale.

The ladies program first began in 1962 to encourage the men to bring their wives to the plowing match. Now, "the program encourages the wives to bring their husbands," said

Mrs. Salter. There will be entertainment, wood carving and food that will appeal not only to the women but also to the men.

The Women's Institutes of Wellington County are not only responsible for the Ladies' Program but also for the largest food tent on the site. This W.I. catering tent will serve good, home-cooked meals to more

than 1000 people a day.

Lots of help will be needed for both the Ladies' Program and the catering tent. "It will give non-W.I. members a chance to work and rub shoulders with W.I. members and see what we are like," said Mrs. Salter. "Perhaps they'll want to become part of the Women's Institute when they see what we are all about."
