At least two noteworthy events have taken place this summer which involve the Women's Institutes. One was the unveiling and presentation of the quilted wallhanging to the Province of Ontario at Queen's Park on June 11. Some of you were there for the ceremony and I am sure many more have visited since.

The second was a pilot project in Bruce County sponsored by FWIO to offer child care for rural farm women. This was a need identified in the study on the needs of rural women carried out by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food in 1983. Women's Institute members everywhere should be aware of this project and be proud that their organization has taken the initiative "to do something". Your provincial secretary, Marcie Johnston, was manager for the project, which involved hiring four university students to serve twenty families. Funding for the project came from a Canada Summer Works Grant. I am sure the potential is there for similar kinds of

projects in other parts of Ontario. Should your branch or district be assessing local needs and determining ways to meet these needs? Maybe a Co-op would be the answer — but someone has to organize it.
