## History published in Alma

Alma Women's Institute, as a bicentennial project, published a history of the Town of Alma this year, thanks to the many hours of work contributed by Tweedsmuir curator Mabel Trask.

Mabel accepted the task of recording Alma's history in 1973 when she first became curator. Recording history is second nature to her now. Mabel has kept a diary her whole life and has included in it the history of the town as well poems and verses she has enjoyed.

The history book, called Our Heritage, lists Alma's firsts, from the first school house built in 1854, to the first telephone, to the first car owner. Many of the articles in the book were researched, collected and written by Mabel, but a history committee was formed by Alma WI to organize the book's production.

Formed in 1980, the history committee of Mabel Trask, Ruth Grose, Marg Hall and Bessie Bosomworth, spent hours proofreading articles and organizing photographs for the book.

Alma WI raised some of the funds for publishing themselves providing catering services in the community. Other assistance came from the Secretary of State.
