Try hugs — not drugs!

Try hugs - not drugs.

That's the message the Nashwaaksis Lions Club in New Brunswick is campaigning to get across to young school children.

News of *Huggy*, a large Care Bear type of stuffed animal, came to our attention via the September 1985 issue of the **Home & Country** newsletter published by the New Brunswick Women's Institutes.

A report in the publication, prepared by Isabel Coburn, explained that *Huggy* had paid a visit to the NBWI banquet in May, hugging many of those in attendance!

Huggy is, in fact, a new character who will be travelling widely in his fight to eliminate drug and alcohol abuse — especially among children.

The NBWI was told there are millions of drug addicts, many of whom are as young as six or seven. The Nashwaaksis Lions asked: "How can we reach out to the young?" The



anwser: Huggy.

Using the motto "Hugs — Not Drugs", the Lions bring Huggy to schools and youth clubs, leaving behind pins as reminders of the discussions that took place during Huggy's visit. The Lions Club believes this approach could become an international campaign.

Wife Abuse Workshop

The issue of wife abuse was tackled head on at a workshop sponsored by the Hamilton area WI.

Participants viewed the film "Loved, Honored and Bruised" and then broke into small discussion groups. Questions addressed included "What emotions did you feel during the film?" and "What challenge does the film present to you and to the Women's Institute?"

Suggestions as to what FWIO members can do included:

- (1) support the establishing of homes of refuge, both orally and financially;
- (2) help provide personal items for the families brought into the shelters;
- (3) report cases of abuse to authorities;
- (4) extend personal friendship to those who we know, or suspect, are suffering abuse.
