Availability and Presentation

Perhaps the book entitled "Mail and Telephone Surveys" by Don A. Dillman would be a useful reference guide in the future.

I hope my comments will be taken in the way they were intended, that is, to ensure a future survey will be better received, that the return percentile will be high, and that the information gathered will be accurate and informative.

I do wish you well in your endeavours and I hope this evaluation will assist in the reorganization of this good organization.
