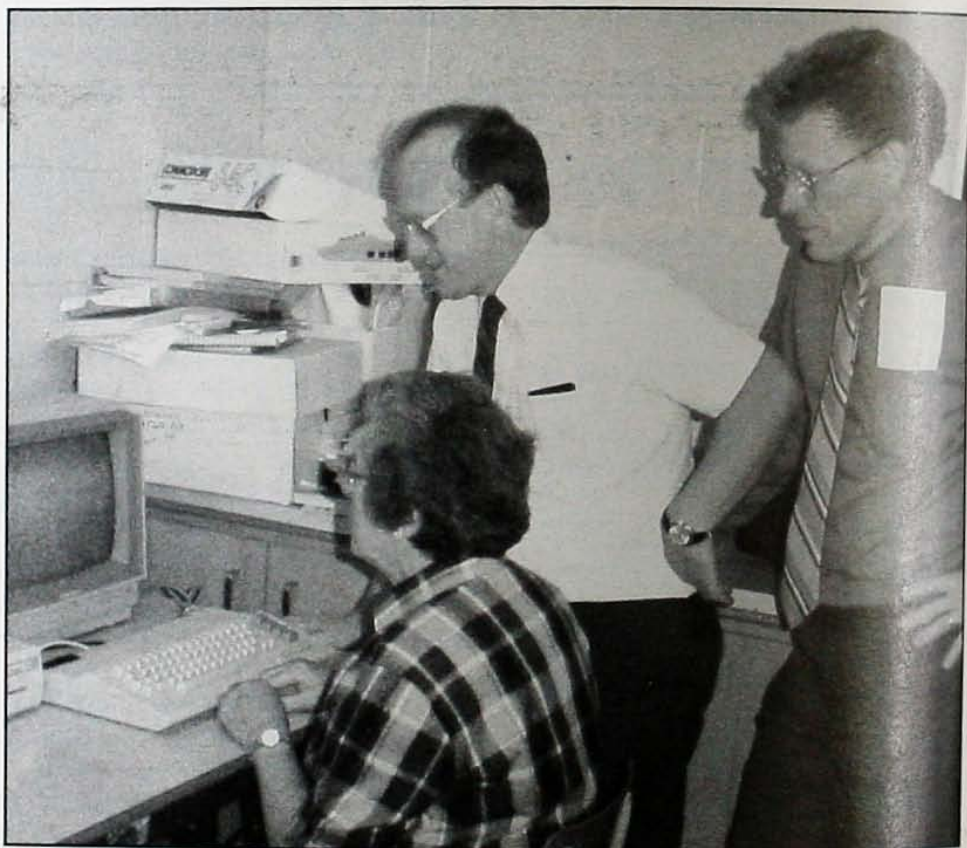
BURFORD WOMEN'S INSTITUTE
