


Kit for students available

Preparing a will

1. *The lawyer or accountant* — either individual may have had a long, close and successful relationship with the testator and/or her family. There may be almost total knowledge of the assets and liabilities of the estate and full confidence by the testator and the remaining family. However, the lawyer

or accountant may not have the time or necessary interest to act.

2. *The trust company* — there are advantages in having a trust company as executor, such as professional status, no problems with disinterested and non-experience. On the other hand, they usually claim full compensation allowed, and lack sometimes in feeling and may be bureaucratic.
