One hundred years ago, the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food (OMAF) was formed. Back then it was called the Department of Agriculture and by 1890 it employed 35 people, considerably fewer than the 1,700 employed today. By 1893, the department had offices at Oueen's Park and by the early 1900's many new branches, including the Livestock Branch, the Fruit Branch, the Agricultural and Horticultural Societies Branch, were formed.

The Women's Institute Branch was formed in 1921 and in the next issue of Home & Country, look for an article tracing the historical relationship of the ministry and WI in Ontario.

In 1988, OMAF is celebrating its centennial by incorporating the birthday theme in some ongoing activities as well as some special vents. On our back cover, you will notice details of a photography contest as well as information on 100 special awards which the ministry will be giving to Ontarians who have made outstanding contributions to agriculture. I encourage you, or your organization, to participate in both of these programs. Also, look out for information on an essay competition, open to students and adults.

On this page you will see the logo designed for the centennial. You are likely to see it on many other OMAF publications this year.
