Essay competition for adults and children



- 2. A covering sheet must be stapled to the front of each entry, listing the following information: your name; address; telephone number; title of essay; and the total number of words in essay. If applicable, also include your grade level and your school's name and address.
- 3. Entries must be the original, unpublished writing of the entrant.

4. All entries become the property of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food. Please retain a copy of your essay. Manuscripts will not be returned.

DEADLINE: Entries must be postmarked no later than June 15, 1988.
