## Surgery - a necessity or a choice?

Have you ever been persuaded to have surgery without adequate discussion beforehand? Have you ever left the doctor's office still wondering what was wrong with you?

These were just a few of the concerns discussed at a series of five workshops entitled "Surgery - A Necessity or a Choice?" This exciting health program for women was presented by Halton District Women's Institute at the Bennett Centre in Georgetown. This unique project was organized originally by the National Council of Jewish Women of Canada, with support from the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, and funded by Health and Welfare Canada.

Mary Jane Wingfield from Ashgrove WI and Edith Turner from Silver Wood WI were the workshop facilitators. They did an excellent job of encouraging questions and discussion. Thirty women took part in the program. The main objective was to help women increase their awareness of their own health care.

The first session dealt with "Doctor/Patient Interviews." Dr. Len Landry spoke on the importance of being assertive. Take a list of questions when you visit your doctor and get the answers you require.

"Options for Breast Health" was presented by Sandra Kenzie, an R.N. who has taught courses on a thorough breast self-examination program. The third session was presented by Jakie Williamson, R.N., entitled "Knowledge of the Reproductive System."

Dr. Debbie Zeni covered the topic of "Surgery - A Necessity or a Choice." Dr. Zeni emphasized the right to a second opinion if a patient is not satisfied with their diagnosis.

The last session dealt with "Consent-Rights, Responsibilities, Trust." A patient should keep a personal health record to include dates of operations, paptests, mammograms, blood tests and results, and dental and optical appointments. This presentation was given by Jean McLean, R.N..
