- 1. Addie was born on Feb. 27, 1857, the youngest of 12. She had 9 brothers and 2 sisters.
- 2. Her home was called The Willows located near St. George, On., and is now a historical site known as The Adelaide Hunter Hoodless Homestead.
- 3. She married John Hoodless in 1881. Addie had her doubts about marrying John because they were not of the same political party or of the same religion.
- 4. John was a furniture maker in Hamilton. The family lived in a house called Eastcourt that no longer exists. In that same location there is a retirement home named after Addie.
- 5. There were four children two boys and two girls.
- 6. Edna Clarkson, Joseph Bernard, Muriel Adelaide, and John Harold. They were born in 1882, 1884, 1886 and 1888.
- 7. Addie helped to start the YWCA, VON, Macdonald Institute in Guelph, the National Council for Women. She wrote the first textbook for Domestic Science; introduced Domestic Science in the schools and also introduced technical and trade courses.
- 8. Addie played golf—she belonged to two golf clubs. She drove a car—much too fast. She felt strongly that girls needed more education.
- Addie's youngest son, John died at the age of 18 mos. from drinking contaminated milk. Addie felt that women needed education to look after their homes and their families.
- 10. Addie died in Toronto while speaking at a meeting on the eve of her 53rd birthday 1910.
