There have been some responses in the last few months in regard to resolutions submitted to various government bodies and agencies.

#### Response to Increasing the Print Size and Colour on Consumer Products

The Hon. Carolyn Bennett forwarded my letter to the Minister of Health as requested, as well as responding herself. She wrote: "The Department does not require that a specific font size be used on the label of over-the-counter drugs in order to accommodate different package sizes and formats. In the case where the package label does not have sufficient space to carry the required information, Health Canada permits further instructions to be included on a package insert, provided the package label instructs the consumer to read the package insert for further information. Should you consider that the labelling of any medication is not clearly displayed, you may wish to report it to one of our regional offices for investigation."

The regional office noted was directed to Mr. Jean-Marc Charron, Manager, Ontario Operational Centre, 2301 Midland Avenue, Toronto ON M1P 4R7.

### Response to The Steven Truscott Case

The resolution has been sent to the Ontario Court of Appeal even though the Federal Justice Minister acknowledged that Mr. Truscott "likely" suffered a miscarriage of justice. This is disappointing since we had asked for complete exoneration.

## Response to Spreading Biosolids on Agricultural Land

The city of Ottawa has once again allowed the spreading of biosolids on agricultural land, again in spite of many requests to the contrary.

I encourage each Branch to write to the appropriate Ministry or other government body or agency. Just think of the impact this could have if each Branch did this on each resolution that they see reported in the Home & Country.

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# Resolutions Sustained at the November 2004 FWIO Board Meeting

- That FWIO urge the Federal Government to enact legislation to make the labelling of all Genetically Modified Food mandatory.
- That FWIO urge the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long Term Care to:
  - (a) immediately increase the funding allocation for Raw Food Costs to \$5.75 per resident per day
  - (b) provide an enhanced rate for northern and other remote communities to compensate for increased Raw Food Costs due to transportation costs
  - (c) review funding for food costs on an annual basis to accommodate the cost of living index in Ontario Long Term Care facilities.
