Shoebridge, and George Scott who worked on the design. Finally, Peter and Mike of Sanderson Monument cut all 161 names into the largest stones. With the concentrated efforts of many, 150 feet of stone fence was completed and we celebrated right on time.

It was October 4, 2003. Between 500 and 600 people attended the dedication. As Master of Ceremony, Joanna conducted a meaningful program, which included words from several dignitaries, the singing of The Maple Leaf, a few moments of silence and The Lord's Prayer. Many in attendance brought stones from their own properties and they were given the opportunity to place them on top of the fence. The three WI Branches involved sang grace and served a fabulous lunch (don't they always?). The program was conducted in sun and wind and rain, and then at the end a rainbow arched itself above the finished memorial as if in Heavenly approval!
