2003 - International Year of Fresh Water

n the world, the environmental factors facing man are global warming, rainforest destruction and ocean over-fishing. But the shortage of fresh water may become abysmal unless the situation is recognized and addressed immediately.

In 2002, the International Year of the Mountain, the world was educated about the fact that mountains collect and store the single most important element for life on earth - fresh water. It was thus predestined that 2003 be designated by the United Nations as the International Year of Fresh Water. The objectives for the United Nations Year of Fresh Water is to increase our awareness of the importance of fresh water resources and to educate us about the fact that life's most significant element must be protected.
