I have been a member of the Women's Institute for over 30 years. The Institute has come to mean many things to me. But the most important thing it emulates is friendship. What would we do without that friendship?

Six years ago I underwent surgery that went wrong, and for the next five years I underwent 33 medical procedures, many of them major. Upon arriving home from my first surgery, I was greeted by a wonderful supper for myself and my family. This continued each night for the next ten days.

I had been out of hospital a short time and still had nursing care at home when the Women's Institutes 100th anniversary celebrations in Hamilton was nearing. Our group had planned and worked hard so they could attend Convention '97. I did not think I would be able to go. But my friends packed me up and took me along, with all my medical equipment. They took care of me so I could enjoy the festivities.

I was never forgotten in those years of challenging times. I received regular phone calls, weekly visits and numerous cards. Sometimes muffins would be dropped off, sometimes homemade soup, or etimes fresh raspberries, vegetables or flower bouquets from their gardens.

Now five years is a long time, four of which I was unable to speak. Communication was difficult, but the ladies of my Institute were always there. This is what the personal side of the Institute is all about - caring for each other, building lifelong friendships, being there to help someone through a difficult time.

I know this generosity takes place in Institute Branches across the country. I know there are many women like those of the Salem Women's Institute in Dufferin South District.
