ummer is over. We are all busy putting our real gardens to rest for the winter. Now, it is time to cultivate our WI ROSE garden. This ROSE garden may save your life or someone's dear to you. Knowledge is our best weapon against the invaders into our health. What a better way to get this knowledge than by presenting or attending a ROSE session.

An article on ovarian cancer came across my desk this summer and I would like to share a piece of information from it. Ovarian cancer is a silent, hard to detect disease. There is now a blood test called "CA-125" that can help detect this disease, although it is not 100 percent. Your

insurance may pay for it, or you may have to pay for it yourself. But, if in doubt, your life is worth it! I attended a ROSE session recently on ovarian cancer. One of the messages relayed was that if your doctor says, "Don't worry about it!" and you are worried, be persistent. It may save your life!

If I may leave you with some advice - know your body and how you feel. Don't be satisfied with "Oh, you are just under stress" or "It's that time of your life, what do you expect?" You should expect and deserve quality and don't take anything less. Ask the doctor your questions as many times as it takes to get an answer. Life is precious. Enjoy it!
