

n November 2001, in partnership with the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair (RAWF) the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario (FWIO) presented their Excellence in Agriculture Award. The RAWF Committee is responsible for selecting a woman who is a Canadian citizen residing in Canada and who has contributed to the Royal in an outstanding manner over a period of time.

From Mount Hope, Ontario, Jane grew up on a dairy farm and was active in both 4-H and Junior Farmers. Over the years, she won many awards for showmanship and judging. After having taught with the Hamilton Board of Education for five years, Jane accepted a position with Holstein Canada in 1976.

As Communications Coordinator for Holstein Canada, Jane also compiles and edits Info Holstein, a bi-monthly publica-



tion, which has been honoured with six consecutive APEX Awards for excellence. Jane also acts as secretary and plays an active role in the association's show committee. That puts her in the forefront for managing Canada's National Holstein Show at the Royal. As well, she organizes the President's Cup Showmanship Competition for youth.
