Resolution Passed

The following resolution re: ground water was passed by the FWIO Provincial Board in August:

That FWIO urge the Ministry of the Environment, the Ministry of Natural Resources and the Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs to protect the ground water of Ontario for future generations by providing more public information and education concerning the importance of ground water and to reinforce Ontario regulations regarding the closure of abandoned wells.

Purity Killings/Honour Killings

A newspaper has recently reported that as many as 50 women accused of prostitution were publicly beheaded by a parliamentary group controlled by a son of President Suddam Hussein. While the reported executions in Baghdad and other Iraqi cities cannot be confirmed, Homa Arjomand of the International Federation of Iranian refugees does not doubt the reports' authenticity. "This kind of activity is called 'honour killing.' It is another example of the war on women."

Amnesty International has issued an appeal for urgent action since there is a concern that scores of women in Iraq could meet the same fate. Disposition of the Resolutions

I wrote to the Ministry of Health in March reminding them of our resolution requesting patient statements for medical services. I did this following a report that Premier Harris had made a similar suggestion. From Tony Clement, Ontario Minister of Health

"Currently patient statements are only available to Ontario residents who request them ... by contacting their local OHIP office listed in the blue pages of the telephone book. ...

The Ministry has also implemented an initiative in the London and Oshawa OHIP offices that advertises the availability of patient statements to a person attending at the office. Interested persons attending at the London or Oshawa office complete a Request for Patient Statement Form and provide a current address where they wish to take delivery of the statement (an option also exists to pick up the statement at the OHIP office). I am continuing to review options that will enhance accountability and awareness in the health sector."

A letter was also received from the Premier (via Leila Pettigrew) about Ontario's environment. The only resolution I can find refers to the clean up of environmental hazards (1998).

Premier Mike Harris

Writes of recent efforts to improve air quality stating that in an announcement "on March 20 that we will implement stronger new air quality standards – the most stringent in North America."
