10 Guidelines for Recognizing Volunteers

n your personal experience, what keeps you returning to an organization and contributing many hours to special projects or ongoing tasks? A simple smile and a warm thank you may spur you to take on another task. But what happens when you work hard and get results, but nobody notices. Soon you begin to question whether you make a difference. There are as many ways to recognize the work of volunteers as there are people in the organization. On the Volunteer Canada website were the following ten guidelines for recognition:

- 1. give it or else
- 2. give it frequently
- 3. give it through a variety of methods
- 4. give it honestly
- 5. give it to the person, not to the work
- 6. give it appropriately to the achievement
- 7. give it consistently
- 8. give it on a timely basis

9. give it in an individualized fashion, and 10. give it for what you want more of.


Let's think of four basic motivators praise, affiliation, accomplishment and power or influence. If you are motivated by praise, you probably like public recognition at an event, in a newsletter or on the organization's website.

If your motivator is affiliation, you probably like recognition through social get-togethers and a name badge to show your membership, or a public listing of your organization's volunteers.

People who volunteer for a sense of accomplishment might appreciate receiving certificates for specific stages of their work, or having a special place to show off their completed projects. Finally, individuals who volunteer for power or influence might appreciate titles for their role or involvement as a speaker at a workshop.
