Peggy has been a dedicated member of WI since 1950, serving with distinction in many offices at the Branch, District and Area levels. She was Provincial President of the FWIO from 1989 to 1991, and in 1992 was elected Canada Area President for the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW), an international organization active in 65 countries.

Active in her local community, Peggy acted as President of the Home and School Association and as a Trustee of her local school board. She has served on the Advisory Boards of the Ontario Agricultural College, the Ontario Veterinary College, the Ontario Agricultural Museum and on the Education Advisory Board for the Grand River Conservation Authority.

Peggy is currently President of the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame and a member of the Executive and Agriculture Administration Committees of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair. Her oganization and communication skills have served her well as a leader. Peggy's influence will be felt in this country and abroad for many years to come.
