and all it stands for, that he decided to write a song in honour of the WI group.

Without the enthusiastic support and work of Committee members Carol Cressman and Margaret McInroy, the event would not have succeeded. Many thanks to both of you.



Strictly limited issues of the medal will be struck in silver, gold and toned bronze. The Royal Mint has also agreed to strike a fourth, lower-priced version in bright bronze. It will measure 38.5 mm across and be mounted in an illustrated folder tracing the history of Women's Institutes from their early days in Stoney Creek to the well-established international organizaton we know today.
