Oil Springs: Where the Oil Industry Began

oil Springs, Ontario, is a village southeast of Sarnia. It's central to the energy history, not only of Lambton County and Ontario, but of the entire world. Oil Springs is the birthplace of the 20th century - the place where the world first started to become the frantic-paced, ever-shrinking globe we now live on.

Oil is an amazing substance. If you had to invent a fuel that would revolutionize this world of ours, you'd come up with something pretty much like oil. It's just right. It's liquid, it's powerful and it has a great deal more energy than coal.

Lambton County's Oil Heritage District is a celebration of oil pioneers. The Oil Museum of Canada is located just south of Oil Springs, in the field where the world's first commercial oil rig was dug.

The Oil Museum of Canada traces the history of the people of the area. Lambton County drillers invented the Canadian pole drilling rig and when their own boom went bust, they took their tools around the world to explore for oil.

The Museum is full of fascinating artifacts with solid links to Oil Springs. There's an outstanding collection of Peruvian water jugs - brought back home by drillers who explored Peru for oil. A Cossack outfit was a gift from Russian nobility to an Oil Springs driller.

When you visit the museum, you will also see the geological conditions leading to the trapping of oil, the evolution of lamps and railways, early prospecting, and drilling and refining practices. There are guided tours, and a theatre, gift shop and picnic area. See a working jerker-line system that pumps the "Black Gold" from the ground, the original Oil Springs Railroad Station or Langbank Post Office (1895) and the "History of Natural Gas" Exhibit in a new Industrial Building.

Oil Springs still produces oil. In fact, you can stand in front of the Museum and see the pumps working just across the road, or pick up a driving tour map and explore the Oil Heritage District. The Oil Heritage Route, marked on the Ontario map, is now easy to follow.

The Oil Museum of Canada hosts many visitors, travelling from near and far to visit the site. Some people will have families who are part of this exciting history, or visitors can relive the boom times and gain an appreciation of an earlier way of life in the historic oil fields that surround the village.

The Oil Museum of Canada's Special Events, such as the "Oil Patch Quilt Show" and "Black Gold Picnic" are regular planned events of the season. Oil Springs is a 35 km, 30 minute drive southeast of Sarnia.
