Also included in the program are information sessions on the work of the Women's Institutes in various provinces, the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada and the Associated Country Women of the World.

For those who are unable to attend the full Convention, special packages are available. Ontario Day will feature tours of the Adelaide Hoodless Homestead, the Erland Lee (Museum) Home and end with a barbecue and a birthday party. Celebration Day includes a fashion show, an historic pageant and an international dinner and program.

Getting Counted!

Women, Unpaid Work and the 1996 Census

On May 14, Canadian women will finally be able to record all their work, paid and unpaid, in the Canadian Census of Population. Questions on household activities and family and elder care will appear in this public document for the first time. Having gained this victory, women now need to ensure that we tell Statistics Canada exactly how much work we do, where we do it, and in the case of caregiving, for whom. How will you answer these questions?

Since Statistics Canada will not be providing any information on these new questions, it will be up to women to inform themselves. Why do questions on unpaid work need to be asked? What are the limitations of the questions? What is the connection between women's unpaid and paid work? And, what will the gathering of these statistics mean to women's lives?

In preparation for Census Day, Mothers Are Women (MAW) has developed a workshop and resource kit on unpaid work, which will be available beginning March 15. The "Getting Counted" Kit is designed to help women become more aware of the



amount of unpaid work they do in the home, the community and for their families and friends. It will also help women place this work into the context of current social and economic policy and to explore the politics of unpaid work. The Kit is intended for use by both organizations and informal groups of women. The 1996 Census Questions will be included!
