

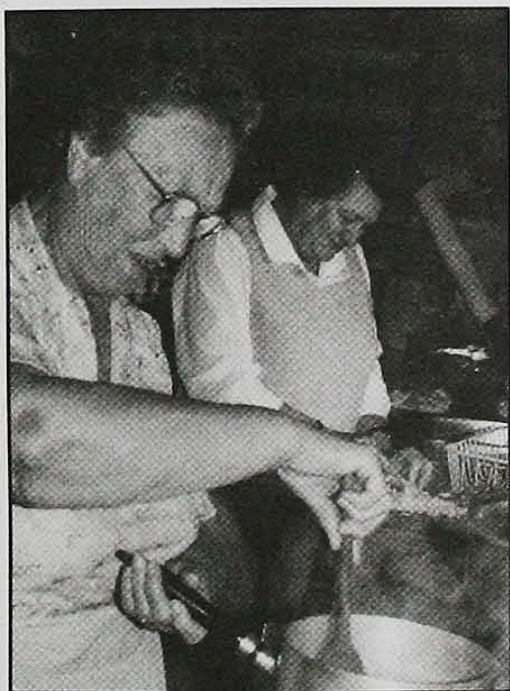
What's Happening . . .
