

in February 1941. Musical Festivals were held in Apsley in 1936-7. In 1938 the pupils from this school joined with the pupils of the neighbouring schools and presented the operetta "The Land of Dreams Come True" and in 1939 presented the operetta "How the Garden Quarrelled".

In May of 1938 Mrs. Kilborn took three pupils from this school, Ruby McColl, Jean Bullied and Audrey Windsor, along with eight other pupils from neighbouring schools to sing at the O.E.A. at Toronto.

In 1933 the school entered the Rural School Fairs. Rev. C.A.G. Spence of Apsley donated a shield which could be owned by the school who won the highest number of average points for three years. The pupils of this school won the shield in 1936, 1937 and 1938 and thus obtained the trophy permanently. Due to the Great World War No. 2 School Fairs were discontinued by the Department of Agriculture. In the fall of 1940 the school entered with the Apsley Agricultural Fair, the Society supplying the pupils in the previous spring with free flower and vegetable seeds. Reta Wilson won the highest number of points for girls and was presented with a book on the "Autobiography of John Buchan".

On May 22, 1939 the pupils and teacher, Miss Laura Ashenhurst, accompanied by a large group of children and teachers of Peterborough County, went to Toronto on a special train to see Their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth when they visited our Dominion.

On February 6, 1939, a new teacher's desk was added to the equipment of the school. In the spring of the same
