The annual meeting of the Women's Institutes of South Renfrew opened at 10.30 a.m. on Friday at Trinity Church with the president Miss Jessie McIntyre of Renfrew in charge. The various reports were read by the secretary, Mrs. J. D. Robinson, Burnstown, and showed that throughout the district there had been a decided increase in membership during the year and that a large amount of money had been raised for various philanthropic works. The resolution committee composed of Miss Annie Jamieson, Bonnechere Valley; Mrs. Archie Johnston, Castleford, and Miss Campbell, of Pine Grove, was nominated, and the branch reports called for. These reports showed splendid work done along various lines. All branches remembered in some way the sick in the community, donated money to different charitable institutions, assisted their schools, had interesting papers and addresses at their meetings, and almost all had participated in the summer series of meetings.

Miss McIntyre spoke briefly on legislation and as chairman of the provincial committee on legislation urged the women to keep abreast of the times and stated that if properly approached the government would put through their legislation. The resolution committee brought in their report and four resolutions were passed in which the women pledged themselves to support in elections only candidates which were in favor of the O.T.A.

vice-president, Mrs. Stewart, Arnprior; secy.-treas., Mrs. J. D. Robertson, Burnstown.
