

The Tweedsmuir Histories

The Tweedsmuir Histories were suggested in 1940 by Lady Tweedsmuir, wife of our Governor General of that period. These are histories of our community compiled by the Women's Histories. It is the aim of the Women's Institutes of Ontario to bring the Tweedsmuir Histories up to date for the centennial year of 1967. In our case, this means there is a lot to be done as our Tweedsmuir is still far from complete.

What can we, as a group, and our community gain from the Tweedsmuir History?

1. They are authentic records of events and developments in the community for anyone wishing to recall same.
2. An educational record for the local teachers to use for teaching local history.
3. A field of research for students of high schools, colleges, and Universities; libraries and museums.
