tons of hay. The religious denominations are recorded as follows: James is listed a Congregationalist, Alexander as Church of Scotland and Agnes as Baptist.

GEDRGE CLARK continued farming the homestead of lots 26 and 27 SDR Kincardine township. Probably no man living in the district had more experience than he in municipal affairs. While still a young man, before his marriage, he served on the board of school trustees for Millarton School S. S. # 1. From this he graduated to the township council, of which he was a member for 17 years, including two terms as reeve in 1920-22. Between filling these posts, he also acted as assessor for the township for 10 years, and for a 2 year period was a commissioner of the Huron and Kinloss Telephone System. For several years his home was used as the Millarton Post Office, this being the brick house which was built in 1901. He was actively engaged in numerous positions at the Millarton Methodist Church.

On May 28, 1890, he married Flora Gordon McFadyen, daughter of Neil McFadyen and Mary Gordon. The ceremony was performed at the home of John Alexander, Durham road, with the Rev. Alex McFadyen, minister of Tiverton Baptist church, and a cousin of the bride assisted by Rev. Thomas Amy of the Bervie Methodist Church. Witnesses were Agnes Clark, sister of the groom and William McFadyen, brother of the bride.

CHRISTINA CLARK remained single and very little is known about her. She was a witness in 1866 at the marriage of her sister Margaret. She signed a legal document on March 11, 1889 which was the basis for George Clark having fulfilled the requirements of James Clark's will so that the land transfer could be properly executed. It notes in the document that she was single. She apparently had travelled considerably as a letter also in 1899 from Willie Clark in Glasgow states "You must be very pleased to have your sister home so near you now after she has been away such a long distance." Her death certificate lists the place of death as Bruce County. A check with the Registrar General indicated there was no town or township mentioned, but it recorded that she was buried in a protestant cemetery and that the informant was J. Kidd, M.D. I have not been able as yet to locate either her grave or the town where Dr. Kidd lived.

MARGARET CLARK was married on July 21, 1886 in Kincardine Township to Jacob Glahn, son of Frederick Glahn and Mary Bome. The minister was Rev. J. L. Murray of Knox Presbyterian Church, Kincardine, and the witnesses were Peter Glahn and Christina Clark. They took up farming for the next 22 years, having purchased lots 48 and 49 on the 2nd concession NDR of Kincardine township. This same land was sold in 1954 by James Glahn to Loran Clark Peter (#122), another descendant of Alexander Clark. Margaret and Jacob did not have any children. Margaret, suffering from a deterioration of health, was admitted as a patient to the Ontario Hospital in London on March 21, 1906 and remained there until her death in 1911. In 1908 Jacob moved to Orleans, Nebraska, where he engaged in the creamery business. He died on February 14, 1933 as a result of complications arising after falling from a load of wood.
