

Death Followed Lengthy Illness
MRS. WILLIAM MCCONNELL.

On Sunday, October 6, 1957, the death of Mrs. William McConnell occurred in Kincardine General Hospital, after a lengthy illness.

Mrs. McConnell, the former Sarah Nesbit, was born in Kinloss township on April 18, 1889 and was the eldest of a family of four children born to Robert Nesbit and Sarah Colwell. On June 22, 1921 she married William McConnell and moved to their farm on the Durham road. The McConnell home was always a place of kindly hospitality. She was a faithful member of St. John's Anglican Church, a member of the Women's Auxiliary. She loved her home and her church and was a truly Christian woman.

A private funeral service was held at her late residence on Wednesday, October 9 followed by a public service in St. John's Anglican Church conducted by her rector, the Rev. James A. Palmer with interment in Kincardine cemetery. The pallbearers were William Slesser, Herb Peter, Gordon Fair, Ralph Horn, Wilfred McCarthy and Jack Nesbit of Palmerston. Nephews and cousins acted as flower bearers.

Mrs. McConnell was predeceased by her husband on April 19, 1957. She leaves to mourn two daughters, Mrs. Cliff Robb (Marjorie) of Holyrood and Mrs. John Dunlop (Alma) of Kincardine; four grandchildren, Lois Robb, Vernon, Bette and Mary Ellen Dunlop; one sister, Mrs. Earl Blackwell of Teeswater; two brothers, Sam of Greenock and Jack of Kinloss.

Served Berrie Area Folk Many Years

FRANK W. BAINTON

Born in the homestead at Berrie on July 13, 1883, Frank W. Bainton passed away there on Friday, October 20 after a period of failing health.

His long residence there made him one of the best known citizens of the area. His father, William C. Bainton had carried on a blacksmith shop at Berrie and on his demise in 1910 it was taken over by his son, Frank, who continued to operate it till shortly before his death.

A deft man with tools, he was a master machinist, a field of endeavour which expanded over the years as the trade of smith receded to be replaced by a garage.

He had another side, too, as a lover of music and an accomplished violinist.

On June 20, 1917 he wed Sarah E. Riddell, who survives, as does a nephew, Frank of Blyth, last of the Bainton family.

Last rites were held at the Linklater Funeral Home October 23, with interment in Kincardine cemetery. The pallbearers were neighbours, William Arnold, James Ferris, Fred Hodgins, Dorne McLeiland, Claude Dore and Clarence Corson. Other neighbours and friends acted as flower bearers.

OBITUARY

MRS. (TREVY) S. MILFORD COLWELL

One of the members of an early pioneer family of Kincardine township, passed away 28 February, 1959 in Kincardine General Hospital, after a brief, fatal illness.

The late Mrs. Colwell was the only daughter of the late Andrew and Jane H. Emerson of Kincardine. She was born in Berrie on the 15th January, 1885 and grew up there.

She was married to Samuel Milford Colwell on the 26 June, 1917. They moved to southern Alberta where they homesteaded for a number of years before returning to the East in 1927. They lived for brief periods at Listowel and Millarston. They moved to Glamis in 1930 to Fairview farm, where they farmed successfully until the untimely death of her husband in a farming accident in July, 1951.

Two years later she and her mother, Jane H. Emerson moved back to the old family home on Broadway. Her mother predeceased her in May, 1953. The home on Broadway was a great pleasure to her and the flowers which it was one of her great joys to herself as well as to others.

In March, 1967 she suffered a severe stroke which confined her to bed and a wheel chair for the rest of her life. She was cared for by her daughter, Mrs. Norman Wain until July, 1968, when she was able to return to her own home with the full time, kindly help of Mrs. Minnie Thorburn.

She had celebrated her 84th birthday on January 15, 1969 which was attended by a number of friends and relatives.

She contracted the flu in late January and did not rally. She was taken to hospital on Monday, February 24th but did not respond and passed away quietly on Friday afternoon, 28 February, 1969.

She leaves to mourn the loss of a loving mother, her sons, Emerson of Glamis, Dr. Bruce of Kingston and one daughter, (Jean) Mrs. Norman Wain of Woodstock; twelve grandchildren and two great grandchildren, and many friends.

The funeral took place from her own home on Monday 3 March, 1969. It was conducted by Rev. Wilkinson of Kincardine United Church, assisted by a long time family friend, the Rev. Leslie S. Mott now of Hamilton and for a number of years, the minister at Berrie United Church. The grandchildren acted as pallbearers and flower bearers. The resting place will be in the family plot in Kincardine cemetery.

WILLIAM CECIL HOLTVY

William Cecil Holtvy passed away at his home at R.R. 4, Kincardine on Sun., August 30 at the age of 70. He had been in ill health for several years.

Mr. Holtvy was born Aug. 14, 1911 in Benito, Manitoba and was the son of the late Eli and Harriet Holtvy. He attended public and high school in Benito.

On June 16, 1931 he married Isabel Margaret Lowes in Swan River, Manitoba. Mr. and Mrs. Holtvy lived in Benito before moving on to Allison, Welland and Kincardine, to farm.

Mr. Holtvy served in the Army from 1943-46 and was active in the community with the Millarston School Board.

Besides his wife, he is sur-

vived by two sons, John Alexander, Toronto, and Kenneth Wain, R.R. 4 Kincardine, and a daughter, Mrs. Mildred Clayton, Inverhuron. He is also survived by a brother, Stanley Thomas Holtvy, Benito, Man. and 10 grandchildren.
