Former minister Bruce Riding A. E. 'Andy' Robinson Dies at 72

A. E. 'Andy' Robinson, 72, of 1200 1st Avenue, St. Paul, Minn., died at his home in St. Paul, Minn., Monday, February 15, 1964.

In 1919 he returned to the home farm and devoted his life to the land, to his family and to his community. He was on the township council and for thirty-four years served the Bruce Municipal (Tribune) Board. He was always active in politics and continually sought to assist his neighbors and his country.

He is survived by his wife Susan (Thompson) and sons, Archie, Barnaby, B.C., George, Port Albert and Alan of Glamis. Two sisters, Retta (Mrs. Albert Heynolds), Toronto and Eva (Mrs. Marjorie Merwin), Kinsdale and nine grandchildren. His eldest son, Jim, predeceased him in 1964. Funeral services were held on Saturday, November 26, from the Linklater Funeral Home with interment in Tiverton cemetery. Pallbearers were Maxwell MacKinnon, Andrew Morris, Burton Eskrick, John McDonald, George Downey and George Nalsett.
