

J. MACKINNON (MAC) JARRELL
Mackinnon (Mac) Jarrell of Sauguen Street, Kincardine, passed away in St. Catharines on Tuesday, January 14, 1966, in his 69th year.

Born June 7, 1917, he was the son of the late George and Minnie Jarrell. He grew up in Kincardine Township on the seventh concession.

After graduating from Stratford Normal School, he taught at the school on the lower fifth.

Early in 1940, he joined the R.C.A.F. and served as navigator-observer on many missions. In the spring of 1941, on one of the first daylight raids over the North Sea, he was shot down and was taken a prisoner of war, and was held in Germany until liberation on May 5, 1946.

Upon his return to Canada, he advanced

his education. Then he joined the Department of Revenue where he worked until he retired in 1979. He and his wife, the former Susan (Toots) Westell returned to Kincardine from St. Catharines and took up residence on Sauguen Street.

Mac was an active member of the Royal Canadian Legion, both in St. Catharines and Kincardine.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Donald of Cyprus and John of St. Catharines, and one daughter Margaret of St. Catharines.

He is also survived by a brother Gordon of Kincardine and five grandchildren. He was predeceased by his parents, a brother John and a sister Georgia.

A memorial service was held Saturday, January 18 at 2 p.m. at the Davey-Linklater Funeral Home, Kincardine.
