Propane Gas Named As Probable Cause Of Explosion

A violent explosion in a cottage seven miles north of here, which claimed the lives of William Esk-rick and Douglas Robinson, both of Armow, was probably caused of Armow, was probably caused by a propane gas leak, according to Robert Kaufman of the Ontar-io Fire Marshal's office in London. Mr. Kaufman said a loose joint in one of the pipes was probably the source of a leak which allowed the gas to seep through the cot-Propane gas is one and one-times heavier than air, and half times heavier than air, and would be concentrated close to the floor. The cottage, built in 1962, had been closed for the winter and well sealed, he said. His in-vestigation also revealed that the stove burners in the cottage were

in an off position. Lawrence Davey, also of Armow, was working outside the cottage at the time of the blast. He received first and second degree burns to his hands and face

gree burns to his hands and face when he attempted to rescue the two men trapped inside.

No decision will be made regarding an inquest until Dr. T. J. H. Robinson of Walkerton, who was summoned to act as coroner in the absence of Dr. M. R. Helliwell of Kincardine, has returned from holidsure.
