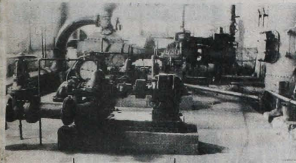

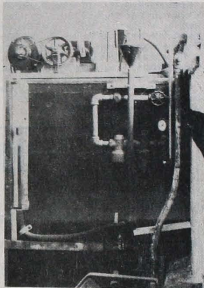

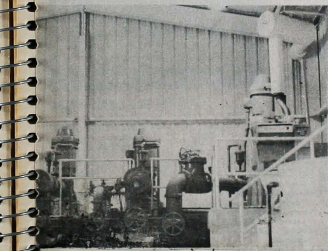

"With world demand for food running at an all-time high, farmers are shooting for top production and are ordering more fertilizer than ever before," said Mr. Wheeler.
