The popular Sunday night gathering began when Clarence "Caddy" Mulen, manager of the Pavilion, complained to Harry Chapman that Lansdowne Park was a dull place for a tourist area. Mr. Chapman, an active member of the Chamber of Commerce at that time, gave the problem some thought and came up with the sing-along idea.

The Chamber sponsored the event until the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 183, took it over.

The sing-a-long hasn't just attracted Kincardine's year round and summer residents, though, according to Mr. Dunsmoor.

"We have people come from Port Elgin and there are two carloads that come over from Walkerton every Sunday night," said Mr. Dunsmoor. "A carload comes over from Brucelea Haven, also."

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Talented entertainers from Kincardine and other points in Western Ontario have performed. Scotlish night is the singalong's largest attraction and Mr. Dunsmoor says organizers try to bring in a new group every year. Silver collections have resulted in several improvements to the park, including the installation of a glassed-in stage and a water fountain.

The Community Singers will be the first band to perform this year, on the July 1st weekend. They'll be singing a specially written Bicentennial song. It is a place where people from all ages can bring their own lawn chairs and sit back and listen or join in the singing while enjoying the world's most beautiful sunset from the shores of Lake Huron.
