Jeff's going to Sarnia Sting

Kincardine player picked up in Jr. A draft's 9th round

Jeff Alcombrack of Kincardine is going to be a Sarnia Sting.

Alcombrack, 17, who has just completed Grade 11 at Kincardine District Secondary School, was picked up by the Junior A hockey team last Saturday.

The Junior A draft was held at Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto. Alcombrack was picked in the ninth round. He's the only Bruce County hockey player to be drafted by a Junior A team this year.

Alcombrack is looking forward to working with the coach, Mark Hunter, who played in the National Hockey League (NHL) for 12 years.

"He's probably one of the top coaches in the league," Alcombrack said.

He heads for Sarnia in two weeks, for one of two fitness tests. He'll have to bench press 150 lbs. as many times as he can, (Alcombrack can do that 15 times) and run two miles in under 13 minutes.

A month later, Alcombrack has to do it again, then head to training camp.

"I'll have to try out, but I think my chances of being a forward are good on that team."

Alcombrack said the team needs six to eight forwards this

year, as that many have graduated from the team.

He played right wing for the Owen Sound Greys Junior B team this past season and was a member of the Kincardine Bull Dogs Junior C team two years ago.

Alcombrack will be boarding in Sarnia and attending

Grade 12 at a school in that city.

Looking to the future, Alcombrack has his sights on the (NHL), but is realistic enough to plan on finishing his education and becoming the owner of his own business if his other plans don't pan out.
