

Our Lady of Fatima Church Scene of Johnston - Vincent Wedding

Officiating at the first Wedding Mass in Our Lady of Fatima Parish's new Church, Rev. A. J. Quinn united in marriage in a double ring ceremony, Miss Marilyn Vincent and Mr. Graham Johnston on Saturday, April 16th, at 11:00 a.m.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Vincent and the groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Garnet Johnston, of Castleford.

The church was adorned with chrysanthemums, tulips and snapdragons.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride was attended by Miss Veneta Gagne, as maid of honour, Miss Kerry Cruise as bridesmaid, and Miss Sharon Vincent, niece of the bride, as junior bridesmaid. The groom was attended by Robert Closs and the ushers were Bernard Vincent, of Montreal, brother of the bride, and Robert Johnston, of Castleford, brother of the groom.
