(a) to help women acquire sound and approved homemaking skills; (b) to help discover, stimulate and develop leadership; (c) to help identify and resolve needs and problems in the community; (d) to help promote the use of available resource materials; and (e) to help develop better informed, happier and more useful citizens. Junior Women's Institutes, open to young women 14 years of age and over, are organized to assist in personal growth, leadership, responsibility and better homemaking practices? the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario promote the courses provided by the Home Econo-mics Branch, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture & Food, on Nutrition, Clothing, Home Crafts and House Furnishings to which women of the Community are invited? the Women's Institute has provided leadership for thousands of 4-H Homemaking Clubs & Senior Training School programmes? programmes for monthly meetings are planned by members and are based on a wide range of topics under Standing Committee Convenerships of Agriculture and Canadian Industries, Citizen-ship and World Affairs, Education and Cultural Activities, Family and Consumer Affairs and Resolutions? the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario has an on-going Scholarship programme providing assistance for further education at local Universities and in countries needing assistance? the International Scholarship Fund of \$50,000.00 was set up to commemorate the 65th Anniversary of the first Women's Institute; with the interest from this Fund young women from various Asian countries were sent to Mysore, India, to study nutrition and food preservation, a young girl from Turkey was trained in midwifery, and leadership training and fresh water supplies have been pro-vided in Malaysia, Zambia, & other parts of Africa?
