Organization of the F.W.I.C.

As early as 1912, discussion was held re: a National organization to bring together all Women's Institutes in Canada. At a meeting in Winnipeg on February 13, 1919, a resolution was passed to establish a National Federation. The first meeting was held on February 15, 1919, and Judge Emily Murphy, a native of Ontario, but at that time living in Edmonton, Alberta, was the first President.

Membership

Membership consists of Women's Institutes of Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Newfoundland & Labrador, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Saskatchewan.

On payment of Provincial W.I. fees, each W.I. Member is automatically a Member of the F.W.I.C.

In 1976, the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada had a membership of approximately 54,076.
