Meet Prince Edward Richard Antony Louis

■ When Prince Edward, third in line to the British throne, after Charles, Prince of Wales, and Prince Andrew, was born to Queen Elizabeth, March 10 of last year, the bells of Westminster pealed joyously and a 41-gun salute boomed over the city. The world had its first glimpse of the royal baby through the color photographs of Cecil Beaton last July. The picture on our cover, showing the young prince and his mother, is one of the second set of official photographs to be released by the palace. It was taken in the drawing room of the royal family's private apartment in Windsor Castle this spring, shortly before the Queen

and Prince Philip left on their state visit to Germany.

Smallest of the four royal children at birth, the young prince, now well into his second year, is a healthy, bouncing boy who plays happily in the nursery with his 5-year-old brother.

The baby was christened *Edward Richard*, both historic names for English monarchs; *Antony*, after Princess Margaret's husband, Lord Snowdon; and *Louis* in honor of Earl Mountbatten, an uncle to Prince Philip.

The picture, showing one of the royal corgis on the sofa with the Queen and her young prince, was



taken by Lisa Sheridan, who has been photographing royal children periodically since 1934 when she first took pictures of Elizabeth and Margaret Rose, children of the then Duke and Duchess of York, on the grounds of Windsor castle. □

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
