DETROIT, Dec. 3.-Henry Ford foresees the coming of "real prosperity" - not "feverish, speculative, false prosperity, but real pros-perity such as you can keep."

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He does not look for "recovery"
but for something better, and he
hopes "we don't recover the old system" with a "bigger and better panic in say 1940."

Incidentally he expressed the view
that business men would be better
off if there were no tariffs anywhere.

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We have quit looking for Santa Claus, he says.

We have quit waiting for miracles.

We are ready to go to work.

We are making progress.

"If we quit waiting for miracles to happen that is a long step forward," he told the press. "I am sure we are making progress, and progress is always painful. We are all wiser men and women than we were and we are going to make better use of the next decade. If you want my opinion ten years from now there will be much real prosperity — I do not mean feverish, speculative false prosperity; but real prosperity such as you can keep, such as to make all previous prosperity look small."
