Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Evans of Owen Sound

Brilliant Career in Financial World Brought

Mr. William Watson Evans, only son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Evans, 664 3rd avenue east. Owen Sound, and one of the leading financiers in Toronto, the head of several large influential financial institutions, died on Saturday shortly after the noon hour at his summer home at Erindale, following an illness of a little more than two months. He suffered an attack of the flu during the last winter, and never fully recovered from its ravages, although he was able for a time to return to his office. The disease, however, affected his heart, and it was this heart trouble which ultimately caused his death on Saturday. His passing, though not unexpected by his family and friends will come as a decided shook to those who were not aware of the seriousness of his condition, and to be financial world generally, as he had many interests in Toronto, in Winnipeg and elsewhere which will suffer materially as the result of his demise.

The late Mr. Evans had a mercoric career in the financial world in Canada. He had a grasp of finance which few men in Canada possessed, was an indefatigable worker in the interests of those who entrusted him with office, never shirked his responsibilities, bore up mantolly under adversity and sought at all times to serve the interests which he represented to the best of his ability, and with an outstanding measure of success.

The late W. Evans was a son of Mr. Win P. Evans was a son of Mr. Win P. Evans and Elizabeth Hearst, stater of Sir William Hearst, was born in the township of Amabel. Bruce county, on July 27, 1890, and has just passed his 42nd birthday. When he was a mere babe the family moved to a farm close to the village of Tara, and deceased attended the Public School at Invermay. Following his Public School course he attended the Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, and was one of its most brilliant students. Following his graduation he attended Victoria College, University of Toronto, from which he graduated in 1912 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He had a brilliant career in the university and attained considerable notoriety as a debater, being a mem-

from which he graduated in 1912 with the degree of Bachelor of Aris. He had a brilliant career in the university and attained considerable notoriety as a debater, being a member of the champion team of debaters to visit other universities. He won the Bankers' Scholarship in political scoromy and followed up this initial success by capturing the P. W. Ellis medal in political science. After having been graduated from the University, Mr. Evans entered upon the study of law at Oagoode Hall articling himself to D. L. McCarthy, K. C., a son of the late Dallon McCarthy, and himself one of Toronto's outstanding barristers. He graduated from Osgoode Hall in 1914 and was at once called to the bar for the practice of his profession. It was while he was with the McCarthy firm that he galued his first insight into the legal side of railway work, as the firm guarded the legal interests of the Orand Trunk Railway in Ontario, and also acted for the Toronto Railway Co. Mr. McCarthy was a specialist on the law of negligence and personal injuries, and Mr. Evans was drawn into this branch of the firm's work, He made such an enviable reputation for thoroughness in this work that he was very soon entrusted with the junior work of defending the Street Railway Co. ogalnat many claims for personal injury, and in this work be gained invaluable experience which brought him to the attention of those higher up in the railway services.

He drifted into the legal department of the Ganadian Northern Railway, in the year 1916, then in course of construction, No legal offices were maintained by this railway, owned by Messra. Mackenzle & Mann, but circumstances made it necessary that a western office be established and Mr. Evans, al-

He continued his financial interests in his Winnipes concerns and gave his personal services and advice to every organization in which he haat interests. He worked many hours a day, often late into the night and through the hot summer months that success might attend his enterprises. He was beloved and estemation of beart and head made friends easily, and was generally looked upon in Toronto and elsewhere as one of the outstanding financiers in the Dominion.
