Their first date was Feb. 13 and they went, by horse and cutter, to a dance in Park Head through a howling snowstorm. The fact that she lost her hat, and the horse nearly went off the road, wasn't a deterrent.

The couple still resides in the home where Mrs.
Gowanlock was born. When she was stricken with cancer, in 1960, and given less than a 25 per cent chance of living the year out, the cattle were sold. At the time of his retirement Mr. Gowanlock was parks superintendent at Sauble Beach.

She quilts, has an antique cruet collection, does gardening, and opens her home to friends, relatives and people in need.

Mr. Gowanlock is known for his cane work, is a former chairman of the Saugeen District high school board, is on the Elsinore community centre board and, according to his family, "is world's greatest granddad and father."
