

Chesley woman "Olympic Torch Bearer"

A Chesley woman is about to share in an unforgettable experience.

Faye Whelan of 2nd Avenue E.M., has been selected as an Olympic torch bearer. She will carry the torch on Day 22 of the 1988 Olympic games in Canada.

Whelan is one of 1,000 Canadians from across the country being part of the Olympic torch relay. She will run the one kilometre distance carrying the flame around her local city square, south-western between Richmond and Chesley on January 5, 1988.

The Olympic torch relay started in St. John's on Tuesday, November 17. It will go to Quebec, the birthplace of the modern Olympics, on Sunday afternoon.

For the 99 days following its arrival in Canada, the torch will visit 10,000 communities throughout Canada. It will be carried by ordinary Canadians. Day Faye Whelan, on Day 22, an excellent, as well as, her own, local and area will lead one of the torch bearers in Calgary, home of the 1988 Olympic Winter Games which start February 13 and end on February 25. The Canadian relay is the longest in Olympic history.

Whelan was selected as one of the torchbearers in 1987, after submitting 30 letters from all the local Paris

Canada. Marie Perre-Casade is the official sponsor of the torch relay.

"I was so excited when I got the letter in the mail," Whelan said. "I am really looking forward to it."

Whelan, who is currently on leave from her job as farm management specialist at the Bruce County Office of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, says she has been out walking up to her miles every day. It provides much meaning about her participation in the relay. The
