

LIVESTOCK

All live stock must have been born on or after January 1st, 1939. Calves should be halter broken and exhibited by the pupil. Lambs should be shown without rope or halter. All live stock must have been raised at the home of the pupil, or if purchased, must have been on the farm at least one month prior to the Fair.

Class

1. Calf—Beef type, grade or pure bred, steer or heifer.
2. Calf—Dairy type, grade or pure bred, heifer.
3. Calf—Showmanship.
4. Lamb—Breeding ewe, must be docked.
5. Lamb—Market Wether, must be docked.
6. Lamb—Showmanship.

Bull calves, either dairy or beef, are not eligible to be shown at the Fair in classes 1, 2 or 3.

POULTRY

7. Barred Plymouth Rock—Cockerel, bred-to-lay strain.
8. White Leghorn—Cockerel, bred-to-lay strain.
9. Barred Plymouth Rock—Hen, bred-to-lay strain.
10. White Leghorn—Hen, bred-to-lay strain.
11. Barred Plymouth Rock—Pullet, bred-to-lay strain.
12. White Leghorn—Pullet, bred-to-lay strain.

Birds must be selected by the pupils from the home flock, or from birds raised by the pupils. Pupils may show only one breed. PUPILS MUST TAKE BIRDS OUT OF COOPS TO EXHIBIT THEM. Judging will take place in the order in which the classes appear in the prize list, and will begin as scheduled in the program.

GRAIN

13. Wheat—Any variety, named, one quart, shown in standard size quart sealer.
14. Wheat—Sheaf, any variety, 2 inches in diameter at centre band.
15. Oats—Any variety, named, one quart shown in standard size quart sealer.
16. Oats—Sheaf, any variety, 2 inches in diameter at centre band.
17. Barley—O.A.C. 21, one quart shown in standard size quart sealer.
18. Barley—O.A.C. 21, sheaf, 2 inches in diameter at centre band.
19. Field Peas—Any variety, named, one quart shown in standard size quart sealer.
20. Sweet Corn—Golden Bantam, 6 ears husked.
21. Field Corn—6 stalks ensilage, with ears attached.

Grain shown in classes 13, 15 and 17, should be especially hand picked, first prize winners in these classes are eligible at Ottawa Winter Fair for extra prize money, and the Senator Haydon Trophy. EXHIBITS IN ABOVE CLASSES NEED NOT NECESSARILY COME FROM SEED SUPPLIED BY THE DEPARTMENT.

POTATOES

22. 12 tubers—Dooleys.
23. 12 tubers—Green Mountains.
24. 12 tubers—Irish Cobblers.

Exhibits in Potato Classes should be especially prepared, as first prize winners in these classes will be shown at Ottawa Winter Fair for special prize money and the Senator Haydon Trophy.

ROOTS AND VEGETABLES

25. Turnips—3 roots, any variety, for stock feeding.
26. Mangels—3 roots, any variety, for stock feeding.
27. Beets—5 roots, Detroit Dark Red.
28. Carrots—5 roots, Coreless Chantenay.
29. Parsnips—3 roots, Hollow Crown.
30. Onions—5 specimens, Yellow Globe Danvers.
31. Squash—1 specimen, Green Warty Hubbard.
32. Pumpkins—1 specimen, small sugar-pie.
33. Tomatoes—5 large Red variety.

Roots and vegetables need not necessarily be from seed supplied by the Department, but must be grown at the home of the pupil and must be selected by the pupil.

FLOWERS

34. Asters—6 blooms, long stems shown in quart sealer.
35. Phlox—6 trusses, shown in pint sealer or pickle jar.
36. Zinnias—Giant type, 6 blooms, shown in quart sealer.
37. Cosmos—12 single blooms, long stems, shown in pint sealer.
38. Calendula—(Scotch Marigolds)—6 blooms, shown in pint sealer.
39. Gaillardia—Annual—6 blooms, shown in pint sealer.
40. Pinks—6 blooms, long stems, shown in pint sealer.
41. French Marigolds—6 blooms, shown in pint sealer or pickle jar.
42. Scabiosa—10 blooms, to be shown in pickle jar.
43. Dahlias—5 blooms, shown in pint sealer.
44. Gladioli—3 spikes.
45. Petunias—6 stems, single common type, shown in pint sealer.
46. Verbena—6 stems shown in pint sealer.

Exhibits in classes 34 to 46 (inclusive) need not be from seed supplied by the Department, but must be grown at the home of the pupil and selected by the pupil.

CONTESTS

47. PUBLIC SPEAKING—one entry from each School or room. Time limit 5 minutes.
48. RECITATION—Pupils up to and including Grade 5. Not more than one entry from each school or room. It is suggested that the time be from 2 to 4 minutes.
49. INTER SCHOOL FOLK DANCING—A group consisting of not more than 8 pupils. Points only awarded—2 points per pupil for the schools standing first, second and third, and 1 point per pupil for every other school entering. Points per pupil based on average attendance.
50. TAP DANCING—Music to be supplied by contestant.
