

Industries.

In the early days of this district, much weaving was done. Robert Carswell and his sister Mrs Andrew Hamilton, who came out from Scotland and Mrs John H. Young who came from Ireland, all owned looms, on which heavy woollen cloth, blankets and carpets were woven.

CHEESE FACTORIES.

In 1901 the farmers got together and subscribed shares in the building of a cheese factory. Some years before this a factory was built at the 8th line on Peter McIntosh's property, near Glasgow, Croft and Denny of Lanark were the owners. They had it moved later to the 6th line near Goshen. This so this necessitated the building of another. Milk was brought from Dewars, Lochwinnoch, Stewartville and the surrounding countryside, to be manufactured into cheese. Then in the years of World War 1. price of cheese went down and that of material for making cheese went up, so the factory was sold to Jas Cox of Pakenham, who had the building torn down & moved away.
