

MAIL SERVICE.

The first Post Office in this School Section was in Lundy's store, and was called Harvey P. O.

"Paddy" Doolan brought the mail from Annapolis three times a week, going by White Lake, Burnstown, Harvey, and Stewartville. He had a span of horses which made the trip, summer and winter.

Later the P. O. was moved to Andrew Young's residence, then down to Glasgow, after the building of the Rail road, and the name changed to Glasgow Station. Mrs J. B. Hutson was Post mistress for quite a number of years, then it was moved to Robert Cherry's house.

When Rural Mail Delivery was established in Glasgow, mail for the surrounding districts was brought on the train to the Station, and distributed by Rural Mail Carriers, a route of 24 miles.

The first mail carrier was Angus H. McInnes, who served for years, then in 1917, Robert Cherry took over, then James Cherry (and James Carswell, Reid Carswell, Taylor Carswell, Kenneth Gillan, and Carswell Simpson who started in 1941.
