

pioneer work for ~~home~~ education in Canada, and its present development is in a large measure due to her tireless promotion of its claims, and the scope of her ideals.

In 1937 the Women's Institutes of North and South Brant, in commemoration of her birthplace in the County erected a Cairn at the junction of Highways No. 5 and No. 24, across the corner from the family home. The inscription on the Cairn reads as follows:—

" To ^{commemorate} ~~commemorate~~ the birthplace of Adelaide Hunter Hoodless, 1859 - 1910, who founded the Women's Institute of Ontario (and of the World) on Feb. 19 - 1897. Erected by the Women's Institutes of Brant County."

In Feb. 1953 Mr. J. B. Hoodless left a bequest in memory of his mother to the O. A. C. at Guelph. Said bequest amounting to the sum of \$6710⁰⁰ to be used for a Scholarship Fund in Home Economics for rural girls.
