## Graphic design is Ryan's goal

Hi, my name is Ryan Hackett and I am currently attending F.E. Madill Secondary School. This year I have been given the opportunity to work in the co-operative education program at school. My coop placement is at McPyatt Advertising, which is located at R.R. #5, Lucknow. Every morning, I work for three hours and return to the school for classes in the afternoon. The reason I chose to work at McPyatt Advertising is because I am interested in doing graphic design in the future.

My employer is Pat McKillop who is the owner/operator of the business. Pat makes many types of signs using vinyl or sandblasting; applies vinyl lettering on vehicles, and designs logos and ads, business cards, and invoices.

First she makes her design on the computer, the design is then sent to a cutter and cut out onto a roll of vinyl. The excess vinyl is stripped away and masking is applied for transferring.

Pat also does sandblasting signs where the process is pretty well the



same as the vinyl signs. The design is done on the computer and then sent to a cutter where it is gut on a sheet of blasting mask. The excess masking is stripped away and placed on the wooden sign ready to be blasted. The sign is sent away to be blasted and returned so it can be painted.

So far I have enjoyed my co-op experience because I have done various tasks which show what this career is like. I have cut and masked vinyl lettering and objects to be put on signs. I have had the opportunity to put lettering on signs, banners, and mailboxes for customers and designed signs on the computer. I have also put blasting mask on signs to be sandblasted and painted them.

This co-op placement has been an enjoyable experience so far and I am learning a lot about this career field. Pat has helped me learn and understand what the work force and this career field has to offer. It has been a really good learning experience for me and I really enjoy it.

In the future, I plan to attend college and further my education as a graphic designer because it seems to me like a interesting field to be working in.
