Robert Jardine of Point Clark made window sashes and coffins by hand. Flannel was woven at John Wilsons, John Armstrong's, and Geo. Storey's. Alex Connolly was a shoemaker. John Emmerton had been a railwayman in England. In Scotland Thos. Welsh had been a tailor and Jas. McCrindle a shoe cobbler. Hugh Henderson was a blacksmith and Eric McKenzie made cider and apple butter. David Walden had been a blacksmith, in Ireland. Stockwell was a lawyer and Hugh Cameron a boat builder, both from Scotland. These were all early settlers near the Pine River.

Near Lochalsh in 1831 were Campbells, McRaes, and Finlaysons. Other Scottish families near the present Reids Corners were John Juror, John Ballantyne, and Geo. Shiells who came from Fifeshire. The Stauffers were Palatine refugees who came to Huron from Ireland. Other German folks by name of Wylds, Rhyvver, and Dahmer came to concession 6 directly from Germany. There seemed no prospect for them at home but the army.

John Snowden came from Armagh, Ireland in 1845 to Brockville and then to Huron. Robt. Greenham came from Yorkshire and helped build the Anglican Church at Lurgan. His brother, Robert, was a minister and also an early teacher at Lurgan. Wm. Wilson was a Justice of the Peace in Ireland. Andrew Stinson and the Wamsleys also came from Ireland. The three Stinson brothers were in Stanley Twp., Huron Co. on their way to Huron Twp. Jas. Wilkie of Amberley came to Huron from Haldimand Co. Jos. Colling and Geo. Featherstone came to con. 4 from England. John Bowers came from Exeter in Devonshire to Port Perry and then to con. 4. From Clarke Twp. in Durham Co. came David Ray, John Ray, Dawsons, Bradleys, Reavies. The Hyslops, Moores, and Frasers came from Lanarck Co. Alexander McCosh came from Ayrshire, Scotland and was a magistrate.
